"Engaging in Conversation: Let's Talk About It" -A Church-wide Zoom Call, August 20th at 7:30 pm, with Rodney Kurimoto



In June, following the death of George Floyd, close to 30 of us participated in a zoom conversation about race in this country and our lives. Did you come away feeling there is still so much more to explore and learn and do and understand? I sure did. So, a small group formed and we call ourselves "Engaging in Conversation." We have planned three follow up conversations over the coming weeks. We hope you will join us!

Get ready for "Let's Talk About It," a churchwide zoom call, August 20th at 7:30 pm, to further explore our perceptions and attitudes about race. During World War II over one hundred twenty thousand Japanese Americans were relocated to internment camps such as Manzanar in the Owens Valley. They looked like the enemy and were treated as the enemy, even though about 62% of them were U.S. citizens. Families were forced to leave behind their businesses, property, and possessions. When released they returned to find those businesses, homes and possessions were gone or no longer theirs. This action forever changed their lives and the lives of generations to follow.

Worship & Gatherings at St. Matthew's

The St. Matthew's Church Family is using Jesus' commandment – Love your Neighbor As Yourself – as its guiding principle. To follow this commandment is to follow the best understandings of how to protect others

from becoming infected. Of special concern is providing protections from someone who does not know they are sick because they are symptom free.

Recently many parts of California including Los Angeles County have experienced an upsurge in infections. Our bishop has been very clear that St. Matthew's and all other United Methodist Churches need to follow all recommendations and requirements provided by state and local governments. So, for the time being St. Matthew's is only having online worship. While we may not have an indoor worship service, we may still have a group of up to 10 in the Sanctuary to provide the online service. With recent upgrades in technology, it is possible for this small group to broaden the leadership in the worship service beyond those who are physically present in the Sanctuary. Online worship is now able to include recordings by the chancel choir, bell choir and others. When it is finally possible to resume indoor in person worship, the worship service will need to include a number of changes to make it less likely for someone who comes to the service to become infected.

Church gatherings of 10 or less may continue. But every one needs to maintain 6 feet of social distancing and wear face coverings. Groups of 10 or less are strongly urged to meet outdoors instead of indoors. When people are outside, it is harder to become infected by someone who is sick but symptom free.

In order for a group to gather – even outdoors – which is larger than 10, a United Methodist church must have an approved written plan for how people will be protected. In addition to social distancing and face coverings, this plan needs to include things like how bathrooms and any shared surface will be disinfected between uses. St. Matthew's is currently developing a written plan for a group gathering on the church's front lawn. Once it is approved by the district, we will schedule a BYO (Bring Your Own) everything (chairs, shade coverings, . . .) event. By Bringing Our Own everything to the lawn, we can see each other in a way makes it harder for anyone to get infected.

The task force that's working on the plan for this BYO gathering is Olga Baker, Mike Gallagher, Bob Hernandez, Marilyn Matthews, Elaine Ono, and Pastor Richard. Contact them if you have any questions, ideas or suggestions.

August 18th is the 100th Anniversary of Women's Right to Vote

On May 21, 1919, the House of Representatives passed what is now the 19th amendment to give women the right to vote. Two weeks later, the Senate followed. When Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the amendment on August 18, 1920, the amendment was adopted. The heart



of the amendment states, "The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex."

On Sunday, August 16 the worship service at St. Matthew's will include a celebration of the 100th anniversary of women's suffrage in the United States. A number of United Methodists – usually women – played important roles in the movement that led up to the passage of the 19th amendment.

- The service ended with an invitation for everyone to sing *Silent Night* with any candles they had lit nearby.

Many people connected with the service as it was happening in the Sanctuary on Sunday morning. Since then, many more have connected with the service.



Praying for Jennifer Study to Resume Soon

This year's Lenten Study was reading *Praying for Jennifer* by John Cobb. When everything shut down in March, the last part of the study had to be postponed. There are now plans for this interrupted



study to resume via zoom. One of the advantages of gathering by zoom is that people can come to the study by a landline phone. So, you don't need to have a computer or internet access to come to the study.

New people are encouraged to join the study when it resumes. Indeed, the best part of the study – new insights into what it means to pray for others – are still ahead. You can get a copy of the book by contacting the church office or ordering online.

Praying for Jennifer is about a teenager named Jennifer. She is involved in a serious auto accident. She is not expected to live. A nurse tells Jennifer's teenage friends that the only thing which can help Jennifer is to pray. Even though most of the teens are not religious, they pray. Jennifer makes an amazing recovery. But then unexpectedly no matter how hard her friends continue praying, Jennifer stops making progress in her recovery. This confuses the teens and leaves them with profound questions about how prayer does – or doesn't – work. So, they begin asking people questions to understand why their prayers were answered at first and then seemed to stop working. Most of the book is about the various answers people give the teens in language that the teens can understand.

The Sanctuary restroom accessibility project is proceeding. It will be completed before we get to worship back in the building.


A Task Force has been appointed to gather information and knowledge of safety procedures necessary, when on-line worship occurs.

An Opportunity to Help Vulnerable Children

Early this year I visited the San Fernando Valley Refugee Children's Center (SFVRCC) founded by United Methodist Church Pastor Fred Morris. Pastor Morris is also the Executive Director of the Center since it's inception in 2015. What I saw moved me. Their undertaking is challenging but incredibly important. It is very much needed by those most vulnerable – children who have been separated from their parents at the border or unaccompanied minors who have made the

treacherous trip from Central America to the Southern U.S. border.

The overarching goal of SFVRCC is to reach out to these children and their families. The Center offers a place of welcome and healing through partnerships with community organizations to provide for basic needs, services and resources including:

- Fun gatherings, field trips, potlucks, etc.
- Clothes, blankets
- Personal hygiene items
- School supplies
- Toys
- Financial assistance for basic care and/or referrals for medical, dental, vision needs
- Emotional and spiritual support

The Center gives kids a sense of warmth and belonging by organizing social activities, providing playtime, tutoring, and most importantly a chance to get acclimated to a new life.

SFVRCC also partners with non-profit law firms and attorneys to ensure that kids receive fair and competent representation during their court hearings. **Over 90% of refugee children who have legal representation are granted asylum** status . . . while those who don't are usually denied.

SFVRCC is an Advance Special of our annual conference. This means the program has a relationship with our annual conference. Other conference Advanced Specials



include The David and Margaret Home, all of the Cal-Pac annual conference camps and campgrounds, and Baker Homes where several people in the St. Matthew's church family live.

St. Matthew's UMC is taking up a virtual special offering benefiting the San Fernando Valley Refugee Children's Center. Your offering will be a practical blessing to the children. There is no a specific date for the offering. So you can give at any time. You can give 3 ways:




